**Keynote speaker:**

We are pleased to announce that the keynote speaker for the conference will be Michael Edwards. Edwards is a Distinguished Senior Fellow at Demos in New York, a Visiting Senior Scholar at New York University's Wagner School of Public Service, and a Visiting Senior Fellow at the Brooks World Poverty Institute at Manchester University in northern England. From 1999-2008 he was Director of the Governance and Civil Society Program at the Ford Foundation in New York. He has also served as a civil society specialist at the World Bank, Oxfam-GB, Save the Children-UK and other NGOs in Washington DC, London, Colombia, Zambia, Malawi, and India. Edwards has written extensively about NGOs, civil society and international cooperation. His 2003 book *Civil Society* is recognized as a leading text in the field, and his most recent book, *Just Another Emperor? The Myths and Realities of Philanthrocapitalism*, has sparked considerable debate about the role and value of nonprofits and NGOs in an ever-changing global economy
